PROGRAM NOTES

When we think of "carols" we think of "Christmas carols" though the word began as the name of not just singing but dancing to celebrate an important moment in the year. The Redden family will sing four carols which come to us from as least as early as the 15th century. They will also sing a polyphonic work from the early German renaissance, a Bach chorale from his Christmas Oratorio, and what has come to be one of the most familiar and beloved of Christmas songs.

In the second part of Bach's great Christmas Oratorio, the evangelist sings the familiar words from the gospel of Luke: "And there were in the same country shepherds . . . / And, lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them, and the glory of the Lord shone round about them . . . "Then, before the angel speaks, the choir sings a chorale: "Break forth O Beauteous Heavenly Light." and we get to experience the glory of the Lord in Bach's music.

The tune that Fred Prentice (1923 – 1994) has arranged, "Sing We Now of Christmas," is a medieval French carol tune, *Noël Nouvelet.* According to Hymnary.org it appears in at least 85 different hymnals, but not always as a Christmas carol. For example, in the 1982 revision of the Episcopal hymnal it is an Easter carol (204: "Now the green blade riseth.").

The Wexford Carol was largely unknown until it was sent to the editors of *The Oxford Book of Carols* by Dr. Gratian Flood. It was published in the first printing of that book (1928). Dr. Flood had taken down the tune and the words from "a traditional singer in County Wexford" and preserved for us a true example of a beautiful folk carol.

The words of "A Babe is born all of a ma[id]," a 15th century carol, are set by the 20th century Welsh composer William Mathias (1934 – 1992). And it is a rich setting that echoes sonorities and surprising rhythms that we associate with the early renaissance.

The text of "There is no rose of such virtue" comes from the 15th century, preserved in a parchment scroll at Trinity College, Cambridge. John Joubert (1927 – 2019) gave the text a modern setting in 1954. It has become a very popular carol in the 20th and 21st centuries.

"Resonet in Laudibus" is a Latin text (perhaps a carol) that calls us to praise and rejoicing, set by Michael Praetorius (1571 – 1621), an important early Renaissance German composer. Praetorius not only performed and wrote music but he also wrote two books that tell us a lot about music theory in the late 16th and early 17th centuries and about the families of instruments that musicians played during that time.

Mel Tormé tells that in a very hot July, 1945, he visited the home of his friend and lyricist Bob Wells and found, on Wells's piano, a pad with four lines of verse on it. Wells explained that he was just trying to cool off. Tormé decided to cool off too, and so was born the American Standard that we all know and love.
